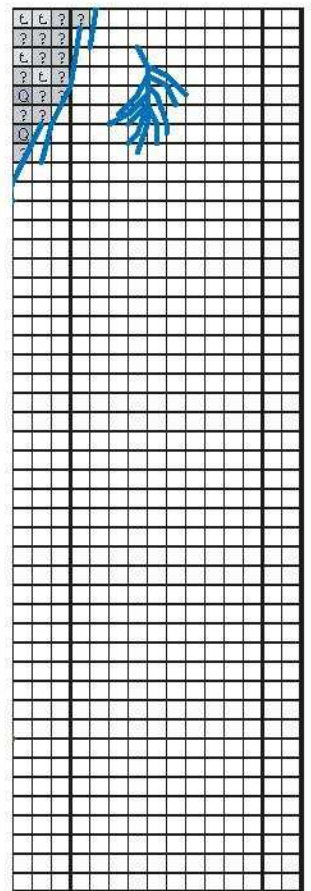
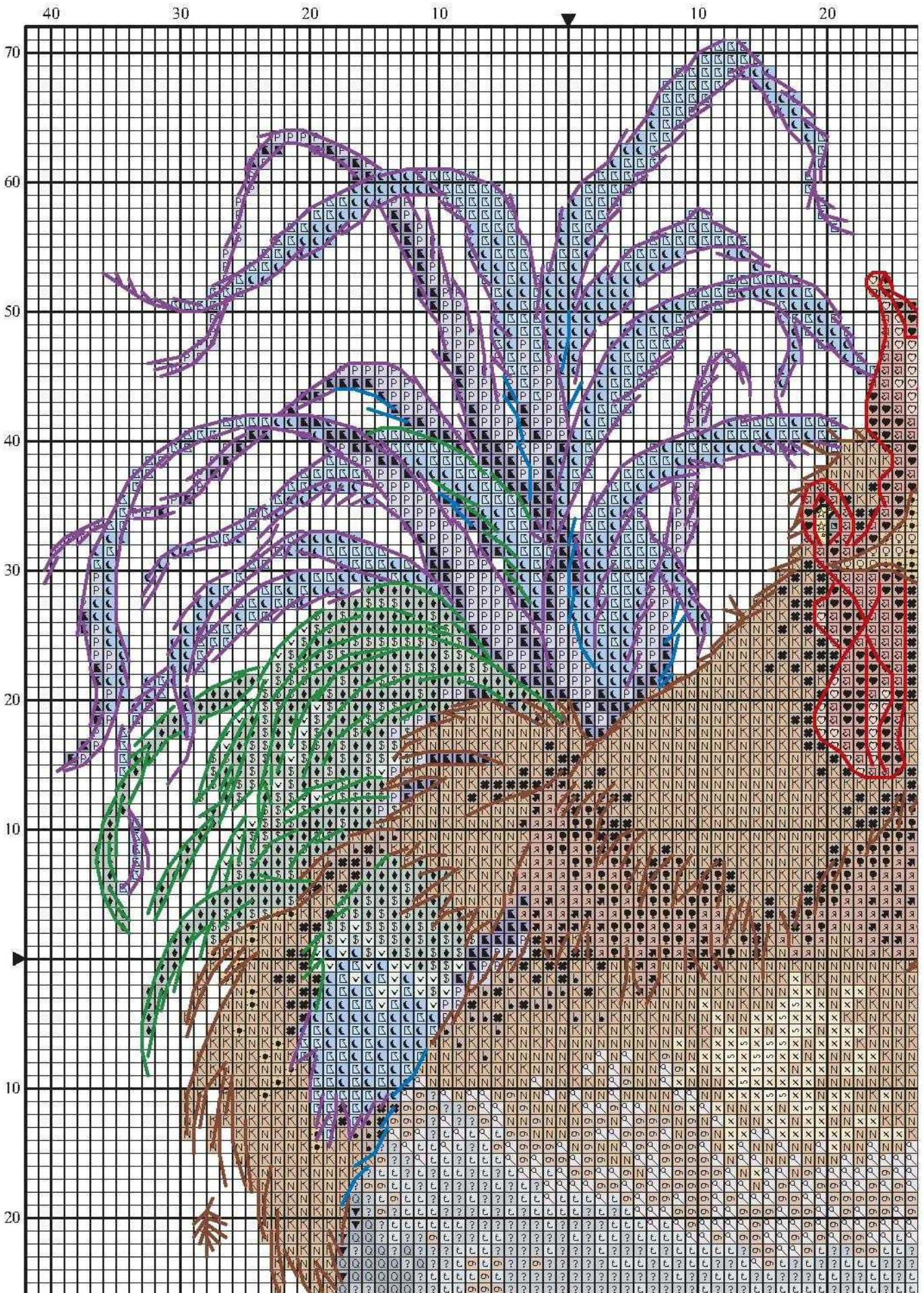


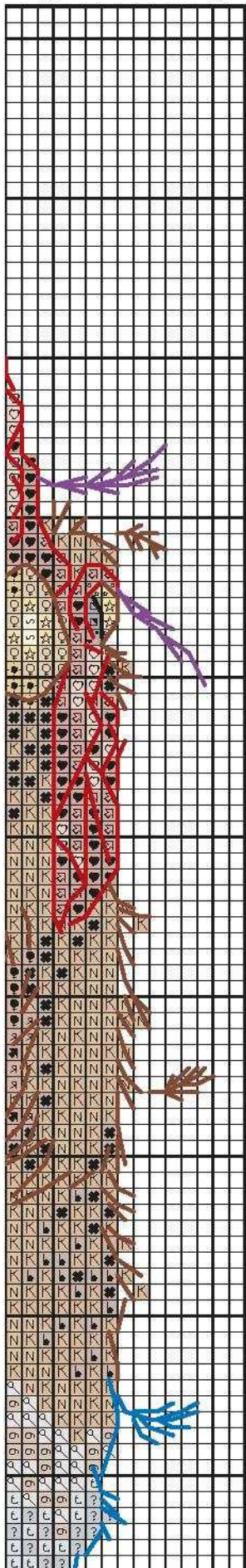
Rainbow Cockerel chart (bottom left)

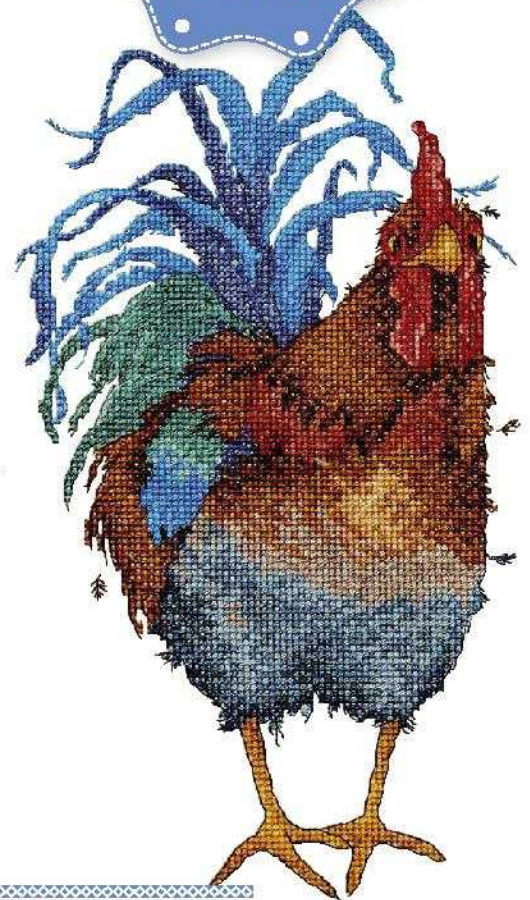
